Fire Station #2 Nears Completion in Town of Beloit

Fire Station #2 is nearing its highly anticipated completion! Furniture installation is underway, bringing the station closer to full readiness as punch list tasks are actively being tackled.

Rapid Intervention Team Training

RIT training ensures firefighters are equipped with the skills needed to rapidly locate and extricate a downed team member. This training emphasizes scenarios such as navigating through collapsed structures, addressing entanglement hazards, managing air supply emergencies, and effectively communicating under high-stress conditions.

Firefighter fatalities or injuries often occur in chaotic and unpredictable environments. Through RIT training, teams learn to anticipate potential dangers and respond with precision. This enhances the overall safety of firefighting operations and fosters a culture of accountability and preparedness.

2024: A Year of Progress and Growth for the Town of Beloit Fire Department

2024 has been a busy and successful year for the Town of Beloit Fire Department. At headquarters, the failing roof was replaced, providing 30 years of protection. Station #2 transitioned from a conceptual design to a state-of-the-art fire station, ready to serve the community for generations. A new ambulance, matching the most recent one, was ordered and is expected to arrive in 2025.

Collaboration with South Beloit continues, with staffing provided to secure critical resources for the greater Beloit area. Significant development within the Town has led to the hiring of additional personnel, moving toward a three-station configuration and the goal of 10 full-time personnel per shift. We are excited about the progress made and look forward to continued positive change in the future.
